The Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Board Elections took place on **Saturday, December 9, 2023**. There were 172 eligible voters where there were 136 registered on Election Buddy. The AGM was held in a hybrid format where there was online and in-person presence, there were **46 members in-person, 11 members online and 18 guests in-person** for a total of **75 people** taking part in the meeting.

As per our bylaws, the Executive Team is selected every 2 years and Directors are selected every year. There was a discussion to hold a special by-law meeting to have the membership vote to change the number of years of directors from one year of service to two years. This meeting did not take place and will be moved to the AGM in 2024.

In the 2023 year, the Executive position that up for election were:

Position #1 – President,
Position #3 – 2nd Vice President,
Position #5 – Secretary
and all Directors.

There was one candidate for the role of President, two candidates for the 2nd Vice President's role, and one candidate for the role of Secretary.

The role of the President was won by acclamation by Mr. Mark Henry (incumbent). Secondly, the role of Secretary was won by acclamation by Ms. Ingrid Barrett (incumbent).

The contestants for the 2nd Vice President were Alexander Townsend (incumbent) and Omaire Morgan. The votes for Alexander Townsend were **49** (online votes and paper ballots) to **31** for Omaire Morgan (online votes and paper ballots). Alexander Townsend retains his seat as 2nd Vice President for the 2023-25 term.

4. Jamaica Association Business Owners and Professionals (JABOP)

This committee was created in 2017 to help promote Jamaican and Black owned businesses primarily as well as Black owned businesses in Montreal. There are currently 55 businesses in the list of Jamaican and Black entrepreneurs. As a result of this mandate, there are now over 106 businesses on the list.

DISSOCIATION OF SOCIAL ENTREPRISES FROM THE JAMAICA ASSOCIATION

The social enterprises of the Jamaica Association, namely our bar (Negril) and restaurant (Cool Runnings), are in process of getting a new NEQ from the Registre des enterprises as required by the Programmes de soutien des organismes communautaires. The confirmation of this request was confirmed in November 2024 after the visit in May 2024. Therefore, no information on the bar and restaurant will be included in this report.

PROGRAMS

1. Au Futur Program

The aim of the program is to continue to help young single Black mothers between the age of 15 to 35. This is a Federally Funded Program and we have worked in collaboration with Maison D'Haiti on this is a reinsertion / reintegration for this target population since 1985.

We continue to work with our clients online, by phone and in person to continue to provide services as per the program outline. The services of the program include:

- 1. accompaniments to medical appointments;
- 2. made home visits:
- 3. help with CV writing and finding employment;
- 4. help women with questions and processes for returning to school;
- 5. Immigration referrals and information;
- 6. Help to find day care services, among other services.

As of October 1, 2023, there were 21 active women in this program and 3 inactive for a total of 24 women. Diane Boyd took over the role of program Coordinator after the departure of both Donna-Angella Stewart and Ianna Miller had left the role. Kim Payton assisted with aspects of the program as well.

As such, Diane Boyd assumed the role and Kim Payton assisted in to ensure that all files are complete among other administrative tasks. When Ms. Boyd left in April 2024, Ms. Payton filled in the role for 4 months until Marguerita Drayton assumed the role of Program Director in early September 2024.

Ms. Drayton is responsible for 3 programs namely Au Futur, Brilliant Minds and Footsteps Programs.

The women in this program are invited to take part in the programs available. Many women use the services of the food bank, tax clinic, adult basic education, footsteps programs and brilliant minds programs.

WORKSHOPS / INTERACTIONS OVER THE YEAR:

1. Tanya Talks

There was one workshop with Tanya Matthews, faculty member at McGill University in September 2023. Dr. Matthews is a postdoctoral research fellow in the School of Communication Sciences and Disorders at McGill University. Her current research interest lies in conducting ethnographical studies to document the oral language and preliteracy practices in the homes of children in low-income families. She is currently conducting this ethnographic study in the Black communities in the Montreal area.

These workshops were entitled "Tanya Talks" and focus primarily on parents reading to children and the importance of that.

2. Collective Kitchen

The women in the Au Futur Program and their children are also invited to attend these sessions done in collaboration with Maison Mosaik.

3. Follow ups

There is regular follow up done with each woman to ensure that they are doing well and to ask about their needs.

4. Dress for Success

As of September 2023, The Jamaica Association formed a partnership with Dress for Success Montreal in order to obtain suits and other professional clothing for women for when they go on interviews. There were 2 women who took advantage of the new partnership. They both expressed an appreciation of the service to obtain well-needed clothing for this purpose.

5. Graduation ceremony

There was no graduation ceremony held in August 2024 due to the number of changes of staff during that period. However, as this collaborative program with Maison D'Haiti has a time frame of 3 years for each woman, another assessment of the progress of each woman to attain their goals will be conducted in the new fiscal year to ascertain who have met their milestones and who is in a good position to exit the program with better skill sets than when they entered.

By October 2023, there were 21 women in the program where the original mandate is 30 women; however, the new representative of the Federal Government has reported with our fiduciary, Maison D'Haiti, that this number women was more than sufficient given the many activities available.

2. Footsteps Program

The aim of the program is to provide the opportunity for children to play together and to offer respite to parents. Finding a physical location was not favourable for this limited program. In September 2023, Markayla Black-Johnson was hired to Coordinate the activities of the online and in person Footsteps program. As of October 1, 2023, there were 20 children registered in the program and they were in Montreal, Quebec and Etobicoke, Ontario.

One part of the activity remained online on Saturdays from 1 pm to 3 pm. We have an educator with the Table de Famille from Centre de Development Communautaire de Côte-des-Neiges who animates the sessions. As an example, activities for the month of November 2023 included the following:

- 1. Quizzes; 2. YouTube Videos; 3. Drawing;
- 4. Kahoot; 5. Math games;

The Zoom sessions took place with the following themes:

- 1. School and Reading (Nov. 4th participants were 2. Remembrance Day; not available);
- 3. Cultures around the world; and, 4. Artemus Mission Launch.

Markayla Black-Johnson reported that the children were engaged throughout all sessions.

Field trips

A field trip to the Angrignon Park on November 25, 2023, took place and themed, "Walk in the Park & Hot Chocolate". It was reported that one family took part in the event.

In March 2024, another field trip was organized to the Planetarium during March break. It was reported that two families took part in this event.

Collective Kitchen

We continue offering the Collective Kitchen every 2nd Monday in collaboration with Maison Mosaik which is done in person on Mondays from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm. We had a chef provided by Maison Mosaik, we also involved an educator from the Fraser Hickson Library to come to read books and play games. Additionally, we had an animator who also took part and engage in play. We hired an assistant who would help to clean up and wash dishes after each event.

Each week, the children and parents would make a meal from a different country and after that the group would eat together and have conversation about many topics of interest which was very enriching for all parties.

3. Adult Basic Education Program (ABE Program)

The courses in our A.B.E. program target adult learners who want to improve their computer, French or English as a second language skills, Math and Finance among other skill sets. We continued to hold courses online during the 2023-24 as students are engaged online as it is convenient for them.

It was observed that students appreciated the online courses and while there were only two terms: Fall 2023 and Spring 2024, there were 50 registrants. The French classes remain our most popular classes Advertising for these courses primarily was on our social media network and in sending emails to members, partner organizations and advertising on our website.

There were only two terms of classes offered due which was Fall 2023 (October to December 2023) and Spring 2024 (April to June 2024). No classes were offered in Winter 2024 due to scheduling and other challenges with respect to registrations.

4. Brilliant Minds Program

This program is for elementary students, high school students and adults seeking tutorial assistance in particular subjects. Volunteer tutors are from United for Literacy. During Fall 2023, there 20 students on the list of participants. We maintained the online tutoring session even though United for Literacy formerly known as Frontier College was on a gradual process to return to in-person tutoring. We opted to keep the online and as a result, the Tuesday night Homework Club sessions were maintained to allow for one evening where tutors meet their respective tutees in online breakout rooms for between 45 mins to 60 mins. This process continues to be a success and we saw a slight increase in the Winter term.

We also adopted the program to make it a Jamaica Association program that is operated out of the Association and no longer with Frontier College. We were also looking for our own tutors as United for Literacy continues to face recruiting issues. There were no donations of books from United for Literacy this year.

5. Food Bank

As of October 1, 2023, the Food Bank continued its partnership with Moisson Montréal.

The purpose of this program is to increase food security by ensuring a healthy supply of not only fruits and vegetables but also of other needed food and non-food items. Clients continue to appreciate the ability to choose their foods they would like can eat or have.

The list of the offerings is posted weekly on our Facebook pages, along with actual photos for clients to review prior coming to the food bank. Many of the clients remarked that they continue to like this process for they can select their preferred items and that they felt respected. We maintained the same protocols used previously to continue to respect physical distancing and safety of workers, volunteers, and clients. The mobile ventilator, used to clean the air of COVID and other pathogens, is placed it in the stairwell to ensure clean ventilated air while clients wait.

Clients remained distanced in the stairwell and on the 2nd floor landing and could not enter the Association except for the use of the lavatory or to choose from select clothing and household items that were donated to the Association. After they had selected their food choices, staff members would then bring out the selected items on a cart for clients to place in their own bags. Clients would enter the main hall to choose clothing or other items.

The hours of operations were Thursdays from 10 am to 5 pm and on Fridays from 2 pm to 5 pm. The cost remained at \$5 for all items selected irrespective of the amount of items chosen. However, in September 2024, the cost of items increased to \$7 and the opening hours on Thursdays changed to 11 am to 5 pm.

This price range is within the guidelines outlined by the partnership agreement with Moisson Montreal. The van that is used primarily for food bank pick up and deliveries has had decals with the Association's name, logo, phone number, email address, website and services added to it for marketing purposes. With the challenges of the maintenance of our delivery van, which is at end of life, we continue to manage to provide for the community.

We saw a slight decrease in the number of clients as shown in Table 6, a decrease of approximately 2 % compared to last year (3536 vs 3620 last year). Our clientele is very diverse and many ethnic backgrounds that include Caribbean, African, Southeast Asian, European, Latin-American, Quebecois, among others. Additionally, we are happy to state that many different religious groups also use our service that include

Christian, Hindu, Muslim, among others. In this year, the Hunger Count metric showed our Food Bank was assisting more than 300 individuals in one month.

Senior members of the organization continue to have the service of home delivery if they call the food bank. use the food bank. A system was developed whereby seniors would contact the Association, place their food order from the weekly list and then receive the delivery on Friday afternoons. This system is still in place and is appreciated by all who use it. We have a list of approximately 9 seniors, where 4 continue to regularly use the service.

There was a limited amount of clothing that was received as this donation was discouraged during the year. However, there is a dry cleaner in Westmount who has donated quality clothing to the Association particularly for the food bank. We thank all those who gave their good items to the food bank clients. These were greatly appreciated.

We also thank members and friends of the Association who continued to donate. By doing so, they have helped vulnerable Montrealers, new immigrants and asylum seekers in the CDN/NDG borough among other boroughs. We continue to mention **Glen Spence**, owner of MTL Bagel located on Westminster Ave. in Montreal, once again who over the past year, he has donated thousands of bagels to help feed those in need. There are many other donors and anonymous donors who sincerely give from the heart and who we thank profusely for their generosity.

6. Tax Clinic 2024

The tax clinic service was available for the 2023 income tax year. We partnered with the Canada Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP associated with Canada Revenue Agency) and the Income Tax Assistance – Volunteer Program (Revenu Québec) to offer this clinic. Participants and tax filers could reach each other via designated zoom accounts, by email and by phone. There were no in-person meetings at the Association.

We had 24 registrants of which 21 submitted all their tax documents and their files were completed. We had 3 tax volunteers, Mark Henry, President of the Jamaica Association, Carlene Clarke, a member of the Jamaica Association, and Ingrid Barrett, Secretary of the Association who is also a tax specialist. We intend to continue this program and partnerships in the upcoming years.

SERVICES

2. Information, Referral, & Jamaican Document Services

The Association continues to offer services to our members and the community large. Throughout the year we assisted with providing application forms for Permanent Resident cards, Jamaican and Canadian Passport forms as well other documents that people had difficulty accessing or completing. Kim Payton, Coordinator of Programs and Services, who joined the Association in July 2020 has created a step-by-step guide for the Jamaican passport application to allow individuals to fill in the forms in a relatively easy and straight forward process. She continues to update any document or process, as needed.

a. J.A.M. Services Directory 2023-24

A directory of various services available in Montreal, Ottawa, Canada, and Jamaica was created in 2020. This document is continually updated over the year to include services that range from Advocacy Groups, Food Banks, Housing, Jamaican Services, Immigration, Legal, Passport and Social Services to Tourism in the Montreal area.

The Jamaica Association became official partners of the YMCA Community Service program again were individuals had to first register with that organization before being assigned to do community work at the Association.

There were 8 participants in the Community Work Program through the YMCA and no youth participants in the Alternative Justice Program this year. The latter program is done in collaboration with Trajet OJA.


4. A place to safely gather


2. JAM Arts Centre

In October 2023, we had 2 full-time office staff which included Kim Payton, Coordinator of Programs and Services, and Diane Boyd Managing Director and Executive Assistant to the President. We had 12 part time staff in the 2023-24 year. As of September 2024, we had two full-time staff members.

MEMBERSHIP, PROGRAMS, SOCIAL ACTIVITIES & PARTICIPATION

Over the course of the 2023-2024 fiscal year, we noted a continued increase in membership to 421 people. This increase was evident in program offerings, services or in social activities. There was renewal of membership and approximately an increase of **4% new members** added to our list, as such we currently have a total membership of **421 people** as of September 30, 2024 (over 399 members last year).

This year, 2024 was an historic one in which we celebrated the birthdays of two centenarians, who were also former presidents of the Jamaica Association of Montreal. Namely Mrs. Ivyline Flemming whose birthday we celebrated in June 2024 and Mr. Renn Brown whose birthday we celebrated in August 2024.

ADVOCACY & COMMUNITY COLLABORATIONS

Over the course of the year, the Jamaica Association continues its role in advocating for the community and there have been several radio and TV interview with Mark Henry, President and Sharon Nelson, 1st Vice President including radio (CBC, CJAD, and CKUT) and TV (CTV news, Global News & City News) interviews once again.

We were also vocal with groups such as the Centre for Research Action on Race Relations (CRARR) and continued to work with their group named Communities United for Race Equality (CURE). In this year, we also worked with CRARR on another program for youth named Youth Against Violence. Funding was through the City of Montreal municipal government. In this edition, there was a basketball tournament that brought together 19 youth teams to play against each other in February 2024. There was even a team formed by the police and employees of the SPVM. The rationale was to bring together youth and police officers and to create connections of trust and sensitization. The teams included Black, Chinese, Caucasian and Filipino teams where one team consisted solely of girls. Throughout the year, we sponsored other basketball games and hosted a soccer and basketball events at the Jamaica Day event in July 2024 to promote this cause.

We have worked with many community groups over the year, chief among them was the Caribbean Coalition Network of Montreal. We have had several activities together and supported each other's activities. In summer 2024, along with the Caribbean Coalition, we put on the Caribbean Carnival in Montreal under the theme UNITY and with the name the Montreal Carimas Festival to highlight our new group hosting this prestigious event.

MENTAL HEALTH, WELLNESS & SAFE SEX

In this year, we continue our role in promoting health and wellness in as many ways as possible. While mental health was at the forefront, and we have partnered with **Dr. Eric Jarvis, Psychiatrist**, and his team at the Jewish General Hospital on a project for first episode psychosis detection and treatment. Monthly meetings take place where we speak on the best approaches to help people find needed help. A launch party of this project was held at the Jamaica Association in summer 2024.

We also are working with **Dr. Judy Luu, Cardiologist** at the Jewish General Hospital in the POWER Hub (to speak with women more specifically on heart health. We have had a number of events to date to discuss this matter but also to take concrete actions like monitoring heart rate and holding presentations.

We continue to place condoms in both the men's and women's lavatories to promote safe sex. In the Black community, discussing sexuality or safe sex are taboo topics. We continue to break that stigma and be also proactive on the matter of sexual health and wellness particularly at this time. Our patrons find this service an important one, as we replenish our stock of condoms in both bathrooms on a consistent basis.

SHARING RESOURCES

Over the past year, our collaboration with many groups has grown, including the Montreal Caribbean Coalition Network. Seven Caribbean islands are part of the group currently: Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Jamaica and St. Vincent and the Grenadines. As part of our work to support each other, and outside of the Black History Month and Emancipation events, the Association has offered free use of its facilities for Coalition members' meetings. If they are hosting an event outside of a membership meeting, we offer a minimal flat rate for use of the space.

When other organizations need help or assistance, we also make ourselves available to help them in the most meaningful way possible either in time or donations when we can.

PARTICIPATION IN COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Throughout the year, we participate in many activities outside the Jamaica Association to support and encourage community involvement at all levels. These events are both social and community based, particularly with the member organizations of the Montreal Caribbean Coalition Network, but also with, CRARR, the West Island Black Community Association as well as with all levels of government and with the Jamaican government and more. When we can, we donate resources, time and materials to organizations as needed. We continue to work with the Regional Public Health Department on health issues within Black communities of Montreal and with Batshaw on the Clinical Intervention Group for Black Communities.

In addition, we are also collaborating with the << Black Opportunity Fund>> in their health care group.
